


Why Saskatoon?



In the Area

Elementary & Secondary Education

Children in Saskatoon have access to free education from Pre-kindergarten to Grade 12 through the city's school system. We host 19 high schools and 87 elementary schools - several of which are within walking distance from Erindale Alliance church. There are also private schools available, which require tuition, including Christian schools.


Saskatoon is the second-youngest city in Canada with a growing international community.
